National Water Week 2011 being held next week, 16 - 21 October 2011, is the premier community water awareness event in Australia, hosted by the Australian Water Association (AWA).

This year's theme – *Healthy Catchments, Healthy Communities* – will provide a platform for schools and communities to get involved in raising awareness about water issues. Also, as part of National Water Week, water professionals who are members of AWA are volunteering their time to engage and inspire students about catchment health. This year, over 130 ambassadors have signed up to visit schools across Australia.

Mr Tom Mollenkopf, Chief Executive of AWA said that this week is important in raising public awareness and understanding of water issues in Australia, particularly in regards to catchment management.

Poor management practices on land can lead to deterioration in water quality. Poor water quality is damaging to the natural environment and increases the level of treatment that our water requires.
